Welcome: GSHFH accepts 2 families into homeownership program

reater Springfield Habitat for Humanity (GSHFH) has welcomed two new partner families. As the title suggests, partner families work in collaboration with Habitat to build their new homes. Partner families participate in construction and in exchange, they are offered no-interest mortgages when they purchase their new homes. The two new families will reside in Springfield.

In order to qualify, potential partner families must pass a lengthy application process, which includes meeting financial requirements, having a need for better housing, a willingness to work with GSHFH, and they must live or work in one of Hampden County's towns. Applicants

must also either be citizens or permanent legal residents.

"This will be two more families we elevate out of substandard housing and into homes of their own," said Debbie O'Mara, GSHFH Family Services manager. "We should all feel good about that. It is why we do the work we do, each and every day."

TupaTupa Toto and Faida Tausi

TupaTupa Toto, his wife Faida Tausi, and their children are a refugee family from Africa who immigrated to the United States in 2015. Under the guidance and support of Jewish Family Services of Western Massachusetts, they settled in Springfield and enrolled the

children in school. In the five years since they arrived, they've integrated themselves in the community and expanded their family and welcomed their fourth child. At church, another refugee told TupaTupa and Faida about Habitat and how their family benefitted from the GSHFH homeownership program. Realizing owning a "personal house" is a dream of theirs, they applied to our homeownership program in spring of 2020.

"We are so thankful to have been approved and our prayer is for Habitat for Humanity to continue assisting other lowincome families," said TupaTupa. "May God bless all the Habitat staff members and partners for this great work they are doing."

Natasha Emery

In 2016, 2018, and summer

of 2020, Natasha applied to our homeownership program. Their current home, a rented apartment, has several issues, including insufficient heating, poor plumbing, mold, bugs, and a lack of security. Natasha is a "fixer" and often finds solutions to the family's challenges, but wants more for her two sons. Since learning of her acceptance into the program, Natasha said she and her boys have driven past the lot of their future home and often imagine what it'll be like to live there.

"Being able to give my boys a home of our own has been a dream of mine for a long time," Natasha said. "To be able to have a backyard for them to play around in means so much."

"Raise the Roof" Online Auction proves successful

hanks to the generosity of our supporters, Greater Springfield Habitat for Humanity's (GSHFH) Raise the Roof Online Auction brought in nearly \$12,500.

Fifty-six participants signed up and bid on 49 items. The most popular piece was a quilted snowman wall hanging/table runner, which received seven bids and sold for \$305. The Dessert of the Month club, which offered a dessert that served eight to 12 people once a month throughout 2021, sold for \$300. Eighteen people claimed prizes. Other auction items included toys and games, furniture, and gift baskets.

The Raise the Roof Online Auction replaced GSHFH's traditional Fall Feastival's silent auction. Fall Feastival is an inperson fundraiser that offers samplings from local restaurants. In the past, the event attracted hundreds of guests, which wasn't possible for GSHFH to host during these uncertain times.
