"Working on these Habitat builds has been a life-changing experience for me," Will said. "I have Villanova University to thank for introducing me to Habitat for Humanity. I would not have learned about the organization if I wasn't selected for one of Villanova's service trips."

Habitat homeowner's child joins board of directors

e may be brand new to the Greater Springfield Habitat for Humanity (GSHFH) Board of Directors, but John "Johnniel" Gomez is no stranger to the organization. In fact, he may be the most uniquely qualified member on the team. After all, his parents own a Habitat home.

In 2010, when Johnniel was just 15 years old, his parents purchased a newly renovated home on Sylvan Street in Springfield. So, Johnniel knows and understands the Habitat culture from the "other side."

"I know how hard it is to go through the process of being selected. I know about the sweat equity hours and how that works," Johnniel said. "I know what it feels like to go through and own a Habitat for Humanity house from seeing my parents do it."

Prior to his parents buying the Habitat house, Johnniel said he remembers growing up in rough Springfield neighborhoods. But, his parents were determined to keep Johnniel and his siblings safe in a stable and loving environment. He also assisted his aunt and a family friend with the sweat equity hours for their Habitat houses. He enjoyed the work and studied it at Roger L. Putnam Vocational Technology High School, before it became an academy. Upon graduation, Johnniel worked in the carpentry trade, but at the University of Massachusetts at

Will graduated from Villanova in 2018 and works in the health care media business field.

Veteran volunteer Tom Eisenman, who worked with Will at the Holyoke build site, said he was impressed with Will's determination and go-getter attitude. They had been assigned the task of installing floor joists in the marked locations. It's not an easy job.

"The joists are heavy and have to be secured with nails 3.5 inches long. It's a tough job because you often have to stand in an awkward position. It's easy to miss the nail head and a lot of force is needed to drive those nails," Tom said. "It can be very frustrating for a beginner because each time a nail bends, it has to be pulled and done over."

Tom and Will completed the project in roughly three hours.

"Will didn't let the bent nails deter him," Tom said.
"If new volunteers haven't grown up in a family where mom or dad is a builder, it can be hard the first few times, and many probably decide not to continue.
But, Will has 44 more states to go."



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
